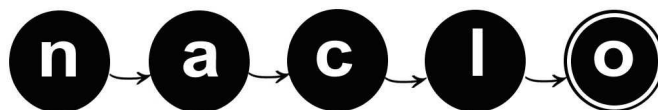

Here are some examples of regular Dutch verbs in their infinitive or plain form and their past participles; for instance, *slibben* means **to silt up**, and its past participle *geslibd* means silted up, as in “It has silted up”. The English meaning is given for information only: it has no bearing on the solution.

Verb	Translation	Past participle
slibben	<i>to silt up</i>	geslibd
klagen	<i>to complain</i>	geklaagd
branden	<i>to burn</i>	gebrand
weren	<i>to resist</i>	geweerd
tochten	<i>to make a draft (wind)</i>	getocht
tellen	<i>to count</i>	geteld
raken	<i>to hit (target)</i>	geraakt
lijmen	<i>to glue</i>	gelijmd
kunnen	<i>can, to be able</i>	gekund
vertellen	<i>to tell</i>	verteld
telen	<i>to cultivate</i>	geteeld
verhoren	<i>to interrogate</i>	verhoord
trouwen	<i>to marry</i>	getrouwd
schaven	<i>to shave (woodwork)</i>	geschaafd
razen	<i>to storm</i>	geraasd
prijzen	<i>to put a price on</i>	geprijsd
lappen	<i>to clean</i>	gelapt
smaken	<i>to taste</i>	gesmaakt
praten	<i>to talk</i>	gepraat
fietsen	<i>to cycle</i>	gefietst
boffen	<i>to be lucky</i>	geboft
