## (H) Phàasàa and Pháasǎa (1/2)

Shan (native term: Phàasàa Tái, เอางาง and Lao (native term: Pháasǎa Láaw, พๆสาลาอ) are Tai languages from Southeast Asia. Shan is spoken in Myanmar and Thailand by about 3 million people, and Lao is spoken in Laos and Thailand by about 20 million. They are quite closely related, but are essentially mutually incomprehensible due to grammatical changes in both languages. Similarly, they are both written in writing systems that descend from the ancient Sanskrit script Brahmi, but these writing systems have rather different ways of marking the same sounds. The Shan writing system is a modification of the alphabet used by Burmese and Mon, whereas the Lao script is a streamlined form of the Thai alphabet.

Note: the diacritics (accent marks) above the Shan and Lao vowels in the Roman transcription of the native terms for the two languages shown above serve to mark tone. The doubled vowels indicate long vowels.
