(B) A Cat in a Hat (1/2) [15 Points]

Chintang (Chintang: छिन्ताङ् Chintān / Chhintang) is an eastern Kiranti language spoken by 5,000 to 6,000 people in Chhintang and Ahale municipalities of Dhankuta District, Koshi Zone, Nepal. Its dialects are Mulgaun and Sambhugaon. A few of the characters used to represent the words in this language may be unfamiliar. ? is a glottal stop, the sound heard in the middle of "uh-oh." ŋ is the sound made by the *ng* in *sing*. A is the sound made by the *o* in *won*.
