Justifications were evaluated by soundness of argument. Most sound justifications involved a counting step, i.e. comparing the number of some English/Irish words, at some point.

Observations that could be made about Irish include:

Word order:

Tá [possessed] ag [possessor].

Nouns come before adjectives.

Noun declension:

After feminine nouns, adjectives have an initial consonant mutation ($C \rightarrow Ch$, C = consonant).
